REVISED MUIS HALAL CERTIFICATION CONDITIONS (HCC) FOR ALL SCHEMES

The Islamic Religious Council of Singapore (Muis) is pleased to announce the release of Version 3.0 of the Muis HCC 2022 for all schemes, **effective 1 December 2023**.

- The revisions to the HCC were made after taking into account feedback from various stakeholders and have been further refined to improve transparency and efficiency of Singapore's Halal regulatory framework.
- The key changes to the HCC are listed below:
 - (i) Blackout period after application rejection or certificate revocation
 - (ii) Conditions for research & development (R&D)
 - (iii) Additional conditions for marketing
 - (iv) Definitions of Halal risk categories for ingredients

The full list of changes can be found in the HCC under *Document Revision History*. The new HCC for the different schemes are available on our website at this <u>link</u>. We strongly encourage all certificate holders to familiarise themselves with the updated HCC.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

REVISED MUIS HCC FOR ALL SCHEMES

1. What are the details of key changes to the HCC?

CURRENT VERSION 2.0	1 DECEMBER 2023 VERSION 3.0
(i) Blackout period after application rejection or certificate revocation	
-	If an application for Halal certification is rejected or a Halal certificate is revoked, the premises will not be able to submit a new application for at least 90 days. This is called the "blackout period". Any new application submitted during this period will be automatically rejected, and any payment made for the application is non-refundable.
(ii) Conditions for research & development (R&D)	
For R&D purposes, the applicant shall submit the relevant supporting documents via email to Muis and obtain Muis' approval before R&D process is embarked.	Applicants who intend to conduct research and development (R&D) within the premises shall comply with the following: (a) Submit a letter of undertaking to Muis via email. The letter should include details on location of storage, R&D production area and source of R&D ingredients. (b) Submit list of high-risk R&D ingredients (refer to Annex A) with relevant supporting documents to Muis via email, if any. Approval for use of these ingredients must be obtained prior to storage and R&D production. (c) Store R&D ingredients in a dedicated area clearly marked with appropriate signage. (d) Maintain the following documents and records: i. Updated list of R&D ingredients, and its supporting documents ii. Original invoices and delivery orders that clearly indicate the ingredients used for R&D iii. Records of R&D production All documents shall be made available upon request.
(iii) Additional conditions for marketing	

Any form of advertising, signboard, menu card / board and corporate collaterals (business cards, invoices, etc.) shall -

- (a) not mislead on the Halal status of the establishment, menu items, products sold;
- (b) not make claims that premises beyond the scope of certification are Halal-certified;
- (c) not resemble those belonging to their non Halal-certified business entities (including logos).

The applicant must ensure that all advertising, signboards, and corporate materials (such as business cards and invoices) shall not:

- (a) mislead on the Halal status of the establishment, menu items, products sold including any collaborations with non Halalcertified business entities;
- (b) make false claims that premises beyond the scope of certification are Halal-certified;
- (c) resemble those belonging to non Halal-certified business entities (including logos and uniform); and
- (d) include elements that may offend or be insensitive towards any race or religion.

(iv) Definitions of Halal risk categories for ingredients	
	Low: Primarily derived from non-animal sources, which are unprocessed or minimally processed
	Medium – Low: Primarily derived from non-animal sources that go through further processing without any animal-based additives
-	Medium – High: Have been highly processed, may involve fermentation or have animal-derived substances added
	High: Contain flavouring, gelatine or meat and its derivatives

2. When will the changes to the HCC take effect?

All changes to the HCC will be effective from 1 December 2023.

This means all certified establishments and establishments applying for certification must comply with the updated HCC requirements by 1 December 2023. Failure to comply with any of the revised conditions may result in non-compliance and could potentially affect the certification status of the establishment.
