INTRODUCTION

The **Communities of Success** initiative by the Islamic Religious Council of Singapore (Muis) is a positive and forward-looking articulation of a vision of Islam and Muslim communities that are compatible with the modern world and thrive in and actively contribute to contemporary societies. This vision is especially critical for Muslim communities living in secular political contexts and diverse social environments, as the socio-religious issues and challenges encountered in such contexts are often without much precedence in Islamic history.

In encountering new challenges, Muslim communities are called to proffer their own solutions by drawing on the diverse and complex traditions of Islam and adapting to the needs of their contemporary societies whilst staying rooted to their Islamic values and principles. This is obviously a delicate balance and requires carefully thoughtthrough and well-developed bodies of knowledge and a new narrative of success. We believe that Muslim communities can co-exist harmoniously and respectfully with other communities of their respective nations and the global world, whilst contributing to the prosperity and progress of their societies through their moral and religious conviction, knowledge, and competencies.

For Muslims in Singapore, there are many similar socio-religious challenges as in other Muslim minorities globally. For many decades, the community had embarked on various efforts to develop confident and practicing Muslims with good social and religious values, particularly through the Singapore Muslim identity (SMI) initiative and guided by local religious leaders and teachers. The SMI is grounded in various attributes - namely Religious Resilience, Inclusive, Contributive, Adaptive and Progressive, or RICAP - that encourage and guide Muslims to be forward looking, adaptive and inclusive in their religious outlook, and to work with the government and civil society to strengthen social cohesion and promote active citizenry. These efforts have fostered Muslims who contribute to nation-building, becoming important nodes within the national grid. In this regard, the role of government institutions and leaders to work together with faith communities in building trust and confidence is key in nurturing success.

INTRODUCTION

In light of new and complex socio-religious issues and challenges faced by the Singapore Muslim community, Muis has initiated several efforts within the Communities of Success initiative with the aim of shaping progressive religious leadership as well as developing new and contextualised bodies of knowledge, including:

Pre-ICCOS Seminar on Muslim Communities of Success in the Context of the COVID-19 Pandemic discussed on how various Muslim communities around the world have responded with resilience and confidence in their societies to forge ahead through the COVID-19 crisis, and the critical role of Muslim theology, jurisprudence and ethics in addressing complex challenges in contemporary times.

Pre-ICCOS Seminar on Muslim Communities of Success in the Context of Secular Societies discussed the importance of context in interpreting texts and traditions particularly for minority Muslim communities living in modern, secular states and how we can leverage on the resources embedded deep within the Islamic traditions to protect the common space and build on the constructive ethos and common vision to live harmoniously and successfully as a society.

Research Programme in the Study of Muslim Communities of Success (RPCS) initiates the development of the contextualised bodies of knowledge by offering a platform for religious scholars and researchers to look into current and future issues impacting the socio-religious life of the Singapore Muslim community. The RPCS focus will be on developing new understanding, interpretations, and applications of Islamic principles, values and traditions to contemporary issues and challenges.

ABOUT ICCOS



In discussing the importance of developing competent Muslim communities in diverse and contemporary communities, the conference will also address the role of educational reforms and social development efforts that can develop resilient and cohesive communities in plural societies. Similarly, the conference aims to examine meaningful collaborative efforts between government agencies and Muslim communities in building robust and resilient institutions that contribute to the strengthening of social cohesion and active citizenry within plural societies and a globalized world.

ICCOS 2022 will be held from **9th to 10th September 2022** at the **Raffles City Convention Centre, Singapore**. The conference will be held in English and Arabic with simultaneous interpretation.

Rahmatan Lil Alamin Foundation (RLAF)

Building Stronger Communities

The Rahmatan Lil Alamin (RLA) or Blessings to All Committee was set up by Muis in 2005 for the Singaporean Muslim Community to radiate compassion and kindness to poor, needy and victims of disaster regardless of the faith, race or creed. It aims to promote and support activities & programmes that project the Rahmatan Lil' Alamin "Blessings to All" spirit, support capacity building of community leaders, youth leaders and volunteers through skills upgrading and training to undertake RLA projects, and promote better understanding and cultivate stronger bonds amongst people of various faiths in Singapore, so as to strengthen inter-faith understanding and race relations in Singapore through humanitarian & community development work.





Bersamamu and TF-Project ARIF

Strengthening Muslim Families

The Bersamamu (With You) programme, an initiative by the Registry of Muslim Marriages (ROMM) under the M3[DH(I] framework, was started to inspire strong and stable Muslim marriages. It is a ground-up initiative by the Kadi & Naib Kadi (marriage solemniser) which seeks to support Muslim couples from before solemnisation to throughout the first two years of their marriage. The Temasek Foundation Achieving Resilient & Inspiring Families (TF-Project ARIF), a collaboration between Temasek Foundation, KK Women's and Children's Hospital (KKH) and Muis, was developed in 2021 as part of the Bersamamu programme to provide better support to couples in preparation for marriage and family life, and to optimise maternal wellness and child development.

Developing competent asatizab to lead in the Singapore context

The Postgraduate Certificate in Islam in Contemporary Societies (PCICS), an initiative by Muis, aims to nurture a generation of confident, compassionate, and competent professional asatizah (religious teachers) with the requisite knowledge and skills to provide relevant and contextualised religious guidance in a highly diverse, plural and inter-connected post-modern world. PCICS is based on a holistic curriculum, dedicating ample attention to both religious and the social sciences to develop a critical-creative thinking mindset, alongside equipping our asatizah with relevant 21st century competencies and professional proficiencies.





Harmony Centre

Faith leaders building social cohesion

The Harmony Centre is an effort by Muis to be open and transparent in presenting Muslim life and culture to Singaporeans. It serves as an integrated hub for the promotion of greater understanding and engagement of all faith communities. The Centre showcases exhibits, artifacts and information on Islamic civilisation and lifestyle, and undertakes interfaith programmes along it three key thrusts: training to build capacity in interfaith dialogue and engagement, learning to deepen understanding of the different faiths, and engagements to build bridges and relationships among the faith groups.

Youth Mentoring Office (YMO) and Kelas Matematika (KMM)

Building youth leaders / Capacity-building within the community

The Youth Mentoring Office (YMO) was set up within MENDAKI (Council for the Development of Singapore Malay/Muslim Community) in 2019 to spearhead mentoring efforts in the Malay/Muslim community. It aims to build a strong mentoring culture and ecosystem, where youth are connected and actively contributing to the aspiration of a Community of Success. KelasMateMatika@CC (KMM@CC), a collaboration of M3 and supported by the Temasek Foundation since 2018, aims to empower parents with Mediation Learning Experience (MLE) skills, so that they are more confident to teach their children in learning the basic numeracy concepts.





M³ Engagement Coordination Office (ECO)

Collaborative effort between Muis, MESRA and MENDAKI, working with national agencies to serve the community

The M^a Engagement Coordination Office (ECO), a collaboration between Muis, People's Association MESRA (Malay Activity Executive Committees Council), and MENDAKI (Council for the Development of Singapore Malay/Muslim Community) aims to build the capabilities of volunteers in M^a@Towns, which are platforms for those in the community to volunteer and work together to help residents closer to home. M^a ECO sets up a training framework for volunteers, to equip them with the necessary skills as well as deepen their understanding of relevant national policies and Government schemes to help vulnerable families. It seeks to coordinate and strengthen outreach efforts in partnership with other Government agencies, Malay/Muslim organisations (MMOs) and other community groups to co-create solutions for bridging the gap and meeting the needs of our community.

Mr. Kadir Maideen, Chief Executive of Muis, Singapore

Mr. Kadir Maideen was appointed as Chief Executive of Muis in November 2021. He was previously the Deputy Chief Executive (DCE) and helmed three different cluster of the organization, namely the Education, Strategic Engagement and Human Capital cluster. As DCE, Mr. Kadir provided guidance in policy development, execution, as well as coordination efforts for the clusters he currently oversees. He is also involved in stakeholders and community engagement in tandem with the outreach efforts of Muis.

Mr. Kadir spent the last 26 years in the Singapore Civil Defence Force (SCDF). He has risen through the ranks and has held both command and staff appointments, including Commander of SCDF's Disaster Assistance and Rescue Team (DART), 2nd SCDF Division and SCDF's National Service Training Institute. Mr Kadir graduated with a Bachelor of Engineering from Nanyang Technological University and has a Master of Science in Risk, Crisis and Disaster Management from University of Leicester, United Kingdom.

THE SINGAPORE MUSLIM COMMUNITY EXPERIENCE SPEAKER



Ustaz Dr. Nazirudin Mobd Nasir, Mufti of Singapore

Ustaz Dr. Nazirudin Mohd Nasir was appointed as Mufti of Singapore in January 2020. He joined Muis in 2002 as an Executive in Religious Development, and later in Islamic Education, before joining the Office of the Mufti in 2006. As Mufti, Dr. Nazirudin chairs the Fatwa Committee and takes lead in providing guidance for the Muslim community's religious life.

Prior to this, Ustaz Dr. Nazirudin has served in different areas of work in Muis, such as in parttime Islamic education, fatwa and religious policies and the development of contextual religious curriculum and content. He was instrumental in developing fatwas such as organ donation and joint-tenancy, and in formulating ethical positions on biomedical issues. He also sits on the Bioethics Advisory Committee Singapore.

Ustaz Dr. Nazirudin studied in the Al-Azhar University in Cairo, the School of Oriental and African Studies in London, and was conferred D. Phil in the study of Abrahamic religions from University of Oxford, UK. He has published academic work in interreligious studies and regularly speaks in interfaith events.

Professor Dr. Mubammad Quraisb Sbibab, Expert on Quranic exegesis and former Minister of Religious Affairs in the Fourth Development Cabinet, Indonesia

Professor Dr. Muhammad Quraish Shihab is an Indonesian expert on Qur'anic exegesis who regularly preaches on national television. He is noted as a progressive scholar who teaches Qur'anic exegesis using context and simple language. He is a member of the Muslim Council of Elders, and an author of many Islamic books, including Tafsir Al-Misbah.

Professor Dr. Quraish served as Chairman of the Indonesian Ulama Council since 1984, Director of State Islamic University, Syarif Hidayatullah (1992-1998), and the Indonesian Minister of Religious Affairs (1998). He was appointed as The Indonesian Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary Ambassador to Egypt and accredited to Djibouti in Cairo (1999-2002). In 2020, he was awarded a medal for his achievements by Egyptian Prime Minister Mostafa Madbouly.

He specialises in Muslim-Jewish relations, interfaith relations, and the history and philosophy of Islamic law in the Malay Archipelago. He is actively involved in speaking and presenting papers in seminars and conferences, conducting training and workshops, and organising summer schools locally and internationally for youth, teachers, and social activists. His educational contribution extended to countries in North America, Middle East, Australia, and Southeast Asia. He is an active contributor to op-eds, journal essays, commentaries, and chapters of books.

Ustaz Dr. Hannan completed his PhD at the Institute of Islamic Studies, McGill University, Canada with a dissertation titled "Islamic Legal Thought and Practices of Seventeenth Century Aceb: Treating the Others". He received his MA (Islamic Civilization) from the International Institute of Islamic Thought and Civilization (ISTAC), Kuala Lumpur. Professor Abdullab Saeed, Sultan of Oman Professor of Arab and Islamic Studies and Redmond Barry Distinguisbed Professor at the University of Melbourne, Australia

Professor Abdullah Saeed is currently the Sultan of Oman Professor of Arab and Islamic Studies and Redmond Barry Distinguished Professor at the University of Melbourne, Australia. He also serves as a Fellow of the Australian Academy of Humanities, a Member of the Order of Australia (AM), and an Advisor to the Studies in Inter-Religious Relations in Plural Societies Programme of Nanyang Technological University, Singapore.

Professor Abdullah holds a PhD in Islamic Studies from the University of Melbourne. His research focuses on contemporary Islamic thought with particular reference to negotiation of text and context, *ijtibad* (independent reasoning) and interpretation. Among his recent publications are: Contemporary Approaches to the Qur'an and its Interpretation in Iran (co-author, 2020); Islam and Human Rights (2018); Reading the Qur'an in the Twenty-First Century (2014); Islamic Political Thought and Governance (edited, 2011); and The Qur'an: An Introduction (2008).

Professor Mona Siddiqui, Professor of Islamic and Interreligious Studies, Assistant Principal for Religion and Society and Dean International for the Middle East at the University of Edinburgh, Scotland

Professor Mona Siddiqui is the Professor of Islamic and Interreligious Studies and Assistant Principal for Religion and Society, and Dean international for the Middle-East at the University of Edinburgh, Scotland. Amongst her most recent publications are, *Human Struggle: Cbristian and Muslim Perspectives* based on her 2016 Gifford lectures (CUP, 2021), *Hospitality in Islam: Welcoming in God's Name* (Yale UP, 2015). She focuses primarily on the field of Islamic jurisprudence (*fiqb*) and ethics and Christian-Muslim relations. She was awarded an OBE for her interfaith work, and the Archbishop of Canterbury's Hubert Walter Award for Reconciliation and Interfaith Cooperation. She has held visiting professorships at several Dutch and American universities, with the most recent at the Helsinki Collegium of Advanced Studies, Finland.

Professor Mona is an internationally known public intellectual and speaker on issues around religion, ethics and public life. She was invited by the Home Office to lead an independent review of sharia councils in the UK, and was a member of the Nuffield Council of Bioethics and British Medical Associations' Medical Ethics Committee. She spoke on religion and politics at the World Economic Forum, and was listed in the 2017 Debretts top 500 list of the most influential people in the UK. She is a fellow of the Royal Society of Edinburgh, with six honorary doctorates and an honorary fellowship of the Royal Society of Scottish Architects for her contributions to public life. She was elected honorary member and first speaker of the Royal Scottish Academy and Vice-President International for the Royal Society of Edinburgh.

Dr. Kbalil Abdur-Rashid, Muslim Chaplain at Harvard University and Co-founder of the Islamic Seminary of America in Dallas, United States

Dr. Khalil Abdur-Rashid is the first full-time University Muslim Chaplain at Harvard University, Instructor of Muslim Studies at Harvard Divinity School, and Public Policy Lecturer at the Harvard Kennedy School of Government. He was the first paid Muslim Chaplain for Columbia University and Barnard College in New York City and served as an advisor to the NYPD Police Commissioner. He also served as Imam in New York City and Scholar-in-Residence at a major Islamic Center in North Dallas. He is the co-founder of the Islamic Seminary of America in Dallas, whose work involves capacity-building for the education, training and development of the local Muslim leadership.

Dr. Khalil earned his bachelor's degree in Social Work from Georgia State University and worked for the state of Georgia as a social worker. He holds a Master of Arts in Islamic law and Middle East Studies and a Master of Philosophy in Islamic Law and Middle East Studies from Columbia University in New York City, as well as a master's degree in Comparative Islamic Law and two advanced Islamic seminary doctoral licenses (*ijaza*) in Islamic Sciences from Marmara University in Istanbul.

Ustazah Sharifah Farah Syed Mahamood Aljunied currently oversees student and curriculum development of the Education Cluster. She leads the development and implementation of the revised Joint Madrasah System's (JMS) primary, secondary and pre-university level Islamic Studies Integrated Curriculum; supervises the three JMS madrasahs and the Mosque Based Kindergartens as well as the management and development of Singapore students in Islamic Universities overseas. Professor Dr. Azza Karam, Secretary General of Religions for Peace International

Professor Dr. Azza Karam is the first female elected as the Secretary General of Religions for Peace International, where she founded the first Global Women of Faith Network and advises on interfaith development work in Muslim-majority countries. She currently is a member of the United Nations Secretary General's 'High Level Advisory Board on Effective Multilateralism'. She served in the United Nations (UNDP and UNFPA), including as a Coordinator of the Arab Human Development Reports, a Senior Advisor on Culture, and Lead Facilitator and Trainer for the UN Strategic Learning Exchanges on Religion, Development and Diplomacy. She was the Founder and Convenor of the United Nations Inter-Agency Task Force on Religion and Development and its Multi-Faith Advisory Council, and has engaged over 500 faith-based organizations worldwide.

Professor Dr. Azza holds a Professorship of Religion and Development at the Vrije Universiteit in Amsterdam, Netherlands. She taught and lectured in various academic institutions in Europe, North America and in the Arab region, and has published widely on international political dynamics, including democratization, human rights, gender, and religion and development. She is a recipient of several awards including an Honorary Doctorate of Humane Letters from John Cabot University, Italy.

Ambassador Ebrahim Rasool, Former Premier of Western Cape and Founder of the World for All Foundation, South Africa

Ambassador Ebrahim Rasool is the founder of the World for All Foundation, which rethinks intellectual tools for co-operative relations between faiths, cultures and communities at a global level and establishes dignity, inclusion and equity for those marginalised and excluded and acts as a conduit for lessons from the example of Nelson Mandela to the Muslim heartlands. In 2013. he convened a Muslim Minority Leaders' Colloquium in Paris under the banner "Living Where We Don't Make the Rules" (also referencing a book he edited in 2022) to find formulae for coexistence in shared spaces for Muslim minorities. He is an Associate of the Albright Stonebridge Group, Founder of OneAfrica.Org, Council Member of the University of the Western Cape, and serves on the Board of the Magasid Institute. He was a founder of The Call of Islam, an antiapartheid Muslim organisation that revolutionised the way Muslims in South Africa thought about democracy, human rights, gender equality, inclusivity, relationships with people of other faiths, ideologies and cultures. He was also instrumental in leading the Interfaith Movement, founded by Archbishop Desmond Tutu, both in the anti-apartheid struggle and through the transition. He convened the National Muslim Conference which defined the future of a Muslim minority in a free and democratic South Africa, as well as two National Interfaith Conferences to help shape the emergent South African Constitution.

Ambassador Rasool was the Former Premier of the Western Cape Province, where he worked towards making it "A Home for All". He was a Member of Parliament in South Africa's National Assembly and Special Advisor to the State President, and South Africa's Ambassador to the United States of America (2010 to 2015). He received various awards, including among others: "Social Services Leader of the Year" Award (1995) from the African Investment Group, the "Nelson Mandela Award for Health and Human Rights" by the Kaiser Family Foundation (1998), London Financial Times "Foreign Direct Investment (Africa) Personality of the Year" Award (2005), "Visionary Leadership and Public Good" Award from the World Congress of Muslim Philanthropists (2008), "Commitment and Leadership in the Fight Against Crime" from Business Against Crime (2009), "Indonesian Diasporean of 2012" Award by the President of Indonesia. He delivered the Panel Remarks at the Faith in Action Breakfast at the US-Africa Leaders' Summit convened by President Obama, the Keynote Address at the British Muslim Council AGM, among others. In 2014, he was awarded an Honorary Doctorate of Humane Letters, Honoris Causa, by the Roosevelt University in Chicago, USA, and the Doctor of Public Service, Honoris Causa from Chatham University in Pittsburgh, PA. He is a Senior Fellow at both Georgetown and Rutgers Universities in the USA, and a Council Member at the University of the Western Cape.

Ms. Yeoh Chee Yan, Chairman of National Heritage Board and Senior Advisor to the Ministry of Culture, Community and Youth, Singapore

Ms. Yeoh Chee Yan is the Chairman of the National Heritage Board and Senior Advisor to the Ministry of Culture, Community and Youth (MCCY), Singapore. In 2012, she was appointed Permanent Secretary of MCCY. Under her leadership, MCCY embarked on new strategic plans for sports, heritage and the arts and championed capability building in citizen engagement across the Public Service. She has also led the Ministry in several successful national initiatives, including the coordination of the SG50 celebrations, the establishment of the National Gallery, the inscription of Singapore Botanic Gardens as a UNESCO World Heritage Site and the successful hosting of the 28th SEA Games. She chaired the Committee on Citizen Engagement under the PS21 Executive Committee, which provides strategic guidance and coordination on whole-of-government engagement issues.

Ms. Yeoh began her public service career in 1985, and served in various appointments, among them Head of the Scenario Planning Office in the Public Service Division, where her team developed the first set of National Scenarios, Permanent Secretary (Education Development) in the Ministry of Education, Deputy Secretary (Policy) in the Ministry of Defence, and Deputy Secretary (Development) in the Public Service Division, Prime Minister's Office. She received a Bachelor of Arts (Honours) degree in Philosophy and Psychology and a Master of Science degree in Social Psychology (with Distinction) from the London School of Economics, University of London, United Kingdom.

Mr. Masagos Zulkifli Bin Masagos Mohamad, Minister for Social and Family Development, Second Minister for Health, and Minister-in-charge of Muslim Affairs, Singapore

Mr. Masagos Zulkifli Bin Masagos Mohamad is Singapore's Minister for Social and Family Development, Second Minister for Health and Minister in-charge-of Muslim Affairs. He entered politics in 2006, after being elected as Member of Parliament for Tampines Group Representation Constituency, and was appointed Senior Parliamentary Secretary for the Ministry of Education. Prior to that, Mr. Masagos Zulkifli was working in Singapore Telecommunications Limited and last held the position of CEO, SingTel Global Offices.

From 2008 to 2014, Mr. Masagos Zulkifli held other positions in the Singapore Government, within the Ministries of Foreign Affairs and Home Affairs. He was appointed Minister-in-charge of Muslim Affairs in May 2018. From October 2015 to July 2020, he was Minister for the Environment and Water Resources. He took on his current appointment on 27 July 2020.
